Dear Commissioner Robbie Hollingsworth,

We appreciate the opportunity to provide you and the board with an overview of our mission and the support needed for our Columbia County athletes and programs.

Incorporated in 1972, Special Olympics Florida is headquartered in Clermont, serving athletes in 67 Florida counties. Special Olympics Florida provides year-round sports training and competition to over 60,000 children and adults with intellectual disabilities, at no cost to the athlete or their caregiver, as a means to achieve physical fitness, self-esteem, and the life skills necessary to be productive, respected, and contributing members of their communities.

Activities exist for those of all ability levels, from the highly functioning to the severely challenged. Anyone may participate in Special Olympics if they meet the eligibility criteria of having an intellectual disability or a similar developmental disability and are eight years or older. There is no upper age limit for participation. We currently serve six athletes in their 80s and one who is 90! We are the only organization that stays with our participants from the moment they register until the end of their life without ever charging them for participation.

Special Olympics athletes train and compete in over 20 sports, including Softball, flag football, soccer, basketball, equestrian, track & field, swimming, tennis, cheerleading, gymnastics, golf, sailing, stand-up paddle, surfing, bocce, pickle ball, bowling, cycling, powerlifting, and triathlon. All athletes train and compete year-round at the County level and can qualify for Regional competitions and State, National, and International Games.

Additional programs include:

- Non-Competitive training: motor activity training for athletes with profound challenges
- Unified Sports: combining athletes with and without Intellectual Disabilities
- Young Athletes: early intervention for children ages 2 through 7 years old

An important component of SOFL is healthcare accessibility. Due to the economic status of our ID population (on average, the population has a high percentage living below the poverty level nationwide), athletes with no access to health care are provided with free screenings and corrective medical assistance where necessary. The Healthy Athletes program provides free assessments at State competitions in the disciplines of Special Smiles, Opening Eyes, Healthy Hearing, FUNfitness, Health Promotion, and Fit Feet. SOFL provided free exams to over 12,000 athletes in 2019 through the support of partnerships with local healthcare companies.



Intellectual Disability does not discriminate. Athletes participating in Special Olympics come from all ethnicities, economic, religious, and social backgrounds. However, a significant number of athletes come from lower socioeconomic groups. In addition, the vast majority of school-aged children with Intellectual Disabilities who attend public schools receive free or reduced lunch, placing them in the atrisk demographic of the population that lives at or below the poverty level. Currently, 65% of Special Olympics Florida's athletes are school-aged, versus 35% who are 21 years and older.

SOFL seeks to provide persons with ID equal access to recreational, leisure, and health opportunities to enhance their quality of life, inspire confidence, build self-esteem, and foster independence.
